Let the sun shine into your heart

If the most beautiful month of summer were to be selected, August would probably win: Because when if not during this classic holiday month can we enjoy life so lightheartedly? Sunny days and mild nights never seem

long enough to enjoy and experience the beauty of everything. Nature surrounds us with lavish abundance. Just like summer as a whole which is always over far too quickly. For school children anyway, who are now starting their

new school year after the big holidays. But also for many others who are looking forward to a new phase in their lives: an apprenticeship or perhaps another job. August 1933 was also such a date for Sister Maria Innocentia, the



creator of the Hummel pictures: On August 22, she received her habit in Sießen Convent and adopted the name of her order. The young woman Berta Hummel became the Franciscan nun Maria Innocentia 85 years ago. One year later, on August 30, 1934, she took her vows. And another twelve months later, the artist visited the Goebel porcelain factory in Rödental in northern Bavaria for the first time. The very first Hummel figurines were then designed there based on the drawings of the sister. And all lovers of the figurines still enjoy the carefree joie de vivre that the Hummel kids radiate.

SUNFLOWERS

Bringing a good mood

INTO THE APARTMENT

Who can resist these children of the sun? Whether from your own garden, from a gardener or from the field: Sunflowers also spread cheer as cut flowers in your home. If you cut your own bouquet, you should choose a dry day and favor half-open flowers. For the splendid blossoms in the vase to provide pleasure for a long time, the lower leaves are removed, the ends cut every other day and the sunflowers placed in lukewarm tap water. This should be changed daily. With an additional freshness enhancer, the flowers in the vase can be kept for up to two weeks.

WHY THE DOG DAYS ARE NO MORE

When the heat comes at midsummer, most four-legged friends also love to lie lazily in the shade. But they have not coined the term "dog days". It goes back to the constellation "Canis Major": One month passes between the first appearance of the main star Sirius in the morning sky until the full constellation can be seen.

The dog days are still considered to be the weeks from July 23 to August 23. However, Sirius doesn't show his face until the end of August these days so that instead of the hottest weeks it actually announces the end of summer.

Quark Wraps

COOL SUN-BURNED SKIN



Quark is a curd cheese produced mainly in Germany where it is one of the classics among household remedies. That is because it cools and moisturizes, effectively alleviates sun-burned skin and is also good for varicose veins. Mix quark with some buttermilk or water, put it on a cloth and place it on the affected area until the mixture is dry. This application is not suitable for people with milk intolerance, on open wounds or severe burns with blistering. A visit to the doctor is advisable then.

HOT DAYS – THICK LEGS?

When the temperatures rise, women in particular suffer from swollen legs. Finding a shady spot and raising your legs is a tempting and soothing option, unfortunately not always feasible. To stimulate blood circulation, however, it can help to bob your feet up and down. Contrast showers, treading water or a cool foot bath also do you good.

Whenever there is time, you should also plan a walk, swimming or cycling. It also means: drink two to three liters a day, eat light and small portions and drink little alcohol. Those who do without tight, high heels in everyday life and instead walk barefoot as often as possible also feel more comfortable. Gels with the active ingredient horse chestnut can provide additional relief for swollen legs.

Marigolds BEAUTIFUL AND HEALING

With their cheerful shades of yellow and orange, marigolds light up the garden from June to October with summery shades of sun. The plants willingly stretch up after sowing. And they make it easy for the gardener: If you let a few marigolds seed out, next summer you will again be delighted with lush – and even edible – flowers without having to do anything else.

As if this ease of care were not enough, marigold petals, as the Latin name *Calendula* suggests, provide the most important ingredient for an anti-inflammatory ointment that promotes rapid wound healing.

This is why it has been cultivated as a medicinal plant here since the 12th century and was once an essential part of any monastery or farm garden. The luminous flowers also have a healing effect as a tea: They are said to relieve stomach complaints and digestive problems. For a large cup of tea, the petals of two flower heads are blanched. They should steep for ten minutes at most.

Marigold ointment

THAT'S HOW IT IS MADE:

A wound ointment is easy to make: Melt 100 g of lard, milking grease or Vaseline in a saucepan. Don't let it boil. Then stir in about a cup of fresh marigold blossoms. Leave the mixture on the stove until it cools down and put it in the refrigerator covered for three days. Then melt the mixture again, filter it through a paper filter or cotton cloth and keep the ointment in the fridge. It keeps for about six months.

BLACK CURRANTS

HEALTHY AND WORTH RE- DISCOVERING

Small, black, round and extremely healthy: Black currants are ripening now which are sort of the poor relations of the berry family. The reason is their sometimes bitter taste. Newer varieties have clearly caught up in terms of aroma and sweetness. Currants taste good as compote, jam or as chutney with ginger, garlic, chili served with meat.

It is not only worthwhile for food lovers, but also for health-conscious fruit lovers to rediscover the black berries. Because they are said to get the immune system going, activate cell metabolism and prevent cardiovascular diseases.

The herb-aromatic fruit is one of the vitamin C stars among berry fruits. In addition, black currants provide plenty of vitamin A, minerals like potassium, calcium, phosphorus and iron as well as dietary fiber.

Hiking for connoisseurs

Sturdy, well-fitting shoes, weatherproof, comfortable clothing, sun protection and a backpack with food and a small first aid kit: That is all hikers need to enjoy walking pleasure in nature. Newcomers start with a short distance with little difference in altitude. You can walk about four kilometers per hour at an easy speed.

If you can still talk with your hiking partner without any problems, you are traveling at the right speed. Then hiking is fun and also good for your health. Late summer and early fall are ideal for relaxed tours at pleasant temperatures.

INDIAN SUMMER PRELUDE TO THE GREAT FINALE OF NATURE

"It is the only summer you can rely on," is a tongue-in-cheek saying about the Indian summer. From around mid-September, almost every year a constant high-pressure weather situation ensures warm fall sun, crystal-clear air and a fantastic view. If you are out early in the morning, you'll discover fine dew-moistened spinning threads giving the garden a silvery shine. They are from young canopy spiders sailing through the air with the help of extremely fine spider silk. But this only works when it

is warm and windless. So these cobwebs are predicting good weather. The threads may have given the Indian summer its name: "Weiben" is an old German term for weaving cobwebs. But there is also another explanation: As late as the 18th century, the seasons were divided into summer and winter only. Spring and fall were called "women's summer". Later spring got the addition "young women's summer" and fall was accordingly called "old women's summer".

SWEET AND HEALTHY ORANGE JUICE REDUCES GOUT RISK

Industrial sugar and sweet lemonades are denounced because they are said to be jointly responsible for gout and obesity. Fruit juices are also considered to be unhealthy because of their sugar content. This is wrong, researchers at the Universities of Hohenheim and Kiel think. They found out in a study that the regular consumption of orange juice even lowers the level of uric acid and thus counteracts gout.

Scientists discovered that anyone drinking a glass of juice with a meal does not have to worry about gaining weight as a result. They recommend one glass of fruit juice per day because this is a valuable supplement to the diet thanks to its vitamins, polyphenols, minerals and dietary fiber which can be used well by the body.

Painter Manuela Gempel has a sealed specimen of "Good Luck!" in front of her: The model appealed to the Franciscan sisters at Sießen Convent and has been released for production. The experienced painter now uses it for orientation purposes.

"This figurine is simply wonderful," Manuela Gempel enthuses. "The colors are really great! It makes fun to do my job." The finishing painter takes care of the expression of the little boy with the blue hat: He gets green eyes which makes the painter particularly happy. "Not only the modern

coloring, but also the intense color of the eyes gives the figurine its very special charisma," she emphasizes.

Finishing the eyes is now particularly difficult compared to the former brown hue and requires several working steps which are also more time-consuming.

The painters attached particular importance to the detailed workmanship of the figurine: "We painters shaded 'Good Luck!' up to the crease of the neck," Manuela Gempel informs. "We pay attention to every little detail."



BLUE EYES: *"Time-consuming and difficult"*

The new eye color demands special skills from the painters at the Hummel Manufaktur. But the result convinces even them. Painter Brigitte Grell explains how difficult it is to finish a Hummel figurine with blue eyes, for example.

"I paint the bows with a feather. Then I put in two even circles as the actual eyes and subsequently

fill in the pupils," she says. Now the paint has to dry a little before the expert can continue working.

"I use a special wooden tool to scrape away a little paint in the pupils and put in the light points," she continues. She then adds the accentuating blue with a very fine brush. This procedure takes con-

siderably longer than finishing brown eyes where the pupils are simply colored in, she explains. "It is very difficult," painter Manuela Gempel confirms, "and takes around twice as long. But the result is impressive. I like the result very much. Our new 'Hummels' have a nicer look with simply more expression," she says.

Manuela Gremmel is a finishing painter. "Such a great expression," the painter enthuses. "The boy simply has a beautiful face." Also new, she informs us, is that the upper and lower lip of the boy's closed mouth are separated from each other with a skillful stroke in a darker red.



The first "Hummel" with blue eyes!

More than 30 years ago, master sculptor Gerhard Skrobek designed this figurine of a kneeling boy with a toy locomotive. Since then, the model has been kept in the archive as a Possible Future Edition (PFE). Collectors can now purchase this extraordinary figurine for the first time, which is also completely new in another respect: It is the first Hummel figurine looking at viewers with blue eyes.

The doctor asked for a drawing of the son

Only a few Hummel figurines can still be connected to the children that Sister Maria Innocentia drew eight decades ago. The new figurine "Where shall I go?" is one such rare case.

The US collector couple Ruth and Robert L. Miller from Ohio, who published the well-known "Price Guide" for Hummel figurines for many years, owned an original drawing of the model for the figurine – Jochen Edinger. "We loved it very much," Ruth Miller says. The couple also owned an early sample of the figurine, which the Hummel Manufaktur now launches as a novelty after many years. Ruth Miller still remembers the purchase of the pastel drawing well: Interested in buying older Hummel figurines, the couple advertised in a German newspaper many years ago. On the basis of this advertisement, Jochen Edinger contacted the Millers and offered them an original drawing by Sister M. Innocentia for sale. Shortly afterwards, Ruth and Robert L. Miller visited the Edinger couple in Rottweil to purchase the painting. "Jochen Edinger was building a new house and needed the money," Ruth Miller reports. "That's right," his widow Marion Edinger confirms, who

also remembers the visit of the collecting couple very well. "We had a long chat, had a lot of fun and went to dinner together," the 78-year-old says today. She is very pleased that the Hummel Manufaktur is now producing a figurine from this painting. During the Millers' visit, the way the drawing came to the Edinger family also came up: Jochen Edinger's father worked as a radiologist in Stuttgart. Marion Edinger reports that the Mother Superior of the Sießen Convent visited him because of an illness accompanied by Sister Maria Innocentia. The doctor learned about the artistic abilities of the sister and asked her to make a drawing of his son Jochen – which she gladly did. Some time later, Sister M. Innocentia is said to have asked Jochen Edinger's father whether she could publish his son's picture as a postcard in the Fink publishing house.



During a visit to Sießen Convent, the Millers spoke to Sister M. Radegundis Wespel, who showed them a drawing of Jochen Edinger, pointing out that the collecting couple had the first picture and the monastery the second picture of Jochen.

Sister Radegundis was General Superior from 1972 to 1984 and remained very close to the Hummel family until her death, Sister M. Emanuela of the Hummel working group of the monastery reports. She has taken countless American Hummel Club groups through the convent and attended many conventions of the Hummel Club in the USA.

"Is it raining?"

With a worried look at the sky, the little schoolboy keeps his umbrella ready. Heavily loaded, he is on his way to school or home, carrying books under his arm and a satchel on his back. Master sculptor Gerhard Skrobek designed the little boy in 1981. The Hummel Manufaktur is now issuing it with blue eyes giving it a very special expression. Hummel lovers have long-time sculptor Skrobek to thank for a series of timelessly beautiful "Hummels" with the newly reissued figurine "Is it raining?" joining their ranks.

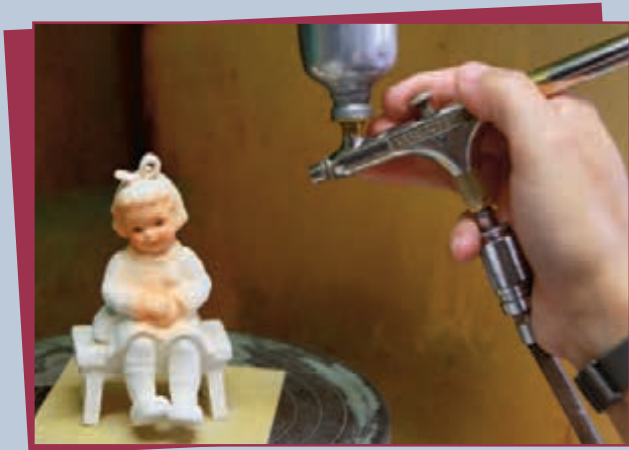

Brigitte Grell has been working as a painter at Hummel Manufaktur for 27 years. She has finished the new Hummel figurine 420 "Is it raining?" with the new blue eye color and thinks that: "It makes our little 'Hummels' look even more vivid."



Decor developer Sabine Tzscheuschner has the first samples of "Charlotte" on her table. She first draws in the little face and sprays red on the cheeks. Hands and face get their skin color. Before the first decor firing at 640 degrees, the decor developer applies ivory to the complete figure with the spray gun. "If we want pure white to appear later, we have to remove the ivory before firing," she explains.

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Who wouldn't immediately be smitten by little Charlotte looking at you like this? She dutifully sits on the stool, a bow holds her hair and she seems to wait patiently. Sculptor Anette Barth designed this completely new, cute girl figurine which is always a pleasure to look at.

The Californian prospectors, the settlers, the cowboys – they wore the first jeans. The rugged pants with the typical rivets, like no other piece of clothing, stand for the American dream and for people who take their lives into their own hands. With the first Hummel figurine in jeans, Hummel Manufaktur pays tribute to the pioneering spirit of people who are brave enough to seek their fortune.

Born in the dawn of the gold rush era in California, the denim pants first make a name for themselves as robust work clothes. Because many gold seekers complain that their trousers shred too quickly during the strenuous work. The young Levi Strauss, an immigrant from Franconia in northern Bavaria, tailors the first hard-wearing trousers out of tent fabric. Soon he imports from the French Nimes the densely woven cotton fabric, which still characterizes these very special trousers: denim. But it was the idea of the tailor Jacob Davis to reinforce especially stressed seams with rivets, laying the foundation for the worldwide success of these unique trousers.

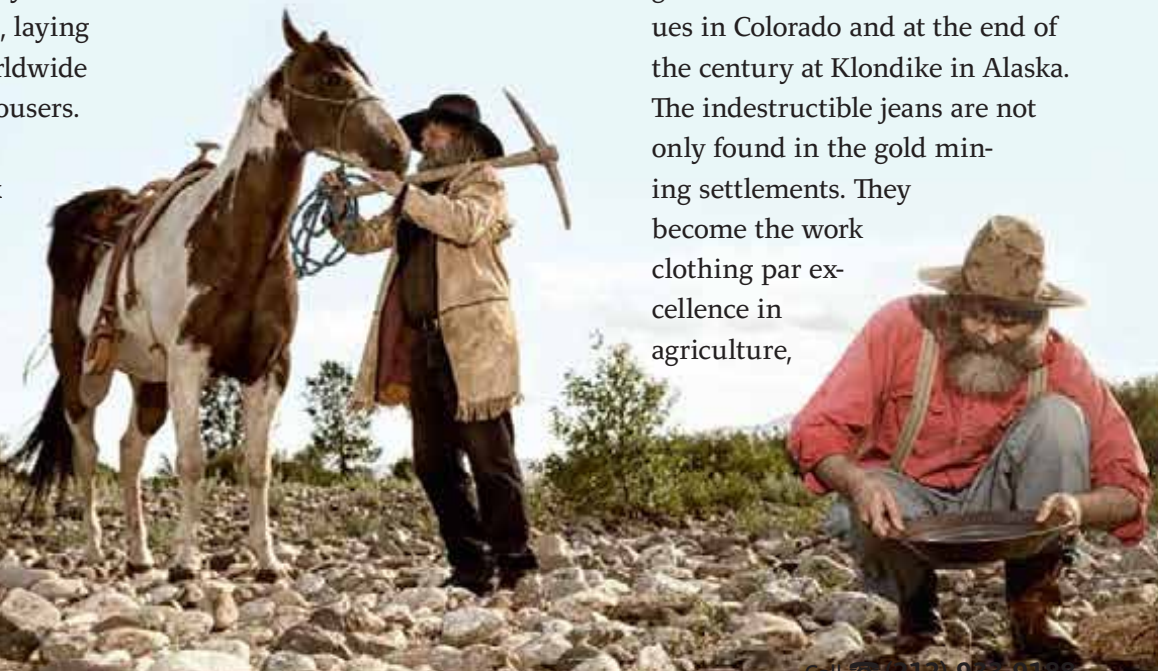
In search of gold and luck

First, they accompany the people of the still young United States: When in 1848, during construction

on the Sacramento River, a few pieces of gold were found, which gave the starting signal for the California Gold Rush. Despite the landowner's efforts to secrecy, the sensational find is soon known to many. As early as 1849, tens of thousands from all over the world set out to seek gold and quick luck in the "Wild West". Only a few discover a large nugget, which immediately made them rich. Most shovel the river sand into their tin pans day after day, always hoping for the one, a great gold discovery. In the face of miserable living conditions, only the belief in the



American dream and confidence in self let people persevere. The gold rush era also becomes a symbol of democracy and equal opportunities: everyone can participate, regardless of their social status, education or origin. As early as 1854, the Californian gold rush is over. Later it continues in Colorado and at the end of the century at Klondike in Alaska. The indestructible jeans are not only found in the gold mining settlements. They become the work clothing par excellence in agriculture,



pants, a lifestyle!

in mines, in crafts and soon conquered the everyday lives of people in the American West. The city dwellers of the American East Coast are also infected by the enthusiasm for the blue denim pants: Inspired by the Western movies of the 30s, they see them as the embodiment of their desire for adventure and freedom.

Marlon Brando and James Dean: rebels in jeans

After World War II, American soldiers bring their jeans to Europe, once again a symbol of freedom. Hollywood provides the blue studded pants their final cult status: Marlon Brando portrays the rebel in jeans, as does James Dean. The pants are now considered an open symbol for protest against tradition and authority. Add to that "Rock and Roll" as the perfect soundtrack for unadjusted denim wearers. Elvis Presley, Rockabilly and Blue Jeans coalesce into an inseparable liaison. Today, there is probably no garment that is made in as many sizes and shapes as jeans. They live with their owners: aging, fading, adjusting their shape, and some always look better with time. Most jeans sold in Europe are still offered in US inch sizes. And the weight of the fabric is measured in ounces – just like gold.

A "Hummel" wears jeans

The American pioneers and gold diggers worked extremely hard to realize their dream of happiness. Robust work clothing was therefore in great demand and jeans soon became a "hit". In homage to the settlers and gold miners of the West, the Hummel Manufaktur has released the very first Hummel figurine wearing a pair of jeans – recognizable by the typical indigo blue and striking stitching. Sculptor Anette Barth created a

Proud chief of the Apache tribe

May we present? The completely new "Chief Clear Sight" will soon be coming to you from the Hummel workshops.



He is perhaps the most famous Indian chief, even if he never actually rode through the prairie on his black horse Iltschi or sat around the campfire with Old Shatterhand: Winnetou, the proud chief of the Apache tribe. This year, he can celebrate his 125th birthday! Since it was first published in 1893, the Winnetou trilogy has sold millions of copies. The Hummel Manufaktur takes this anniversary as an opportunity to issue the figurine "Chief

Clear Sight". Master sculptor Marion Huschka designed the new Hummel figurine with great attention to detail: For example, the fringes on the top and the binding ribbon are shown with a relief-like structure. Marion Huschka has put a pattern and a feather on the headband. And you can imagine the decorations on the top. The "Chief Clear Sight" shades his face with his hand and gazes into the distance with alert eyes. The next adventure awaits!

The clay model of "Chief Clear Sight" is cut into its individual parts using model and mold technology. This is the only way that larger numbers of the proud Indian chief can be produced later on.

The painter first draws the eyes.

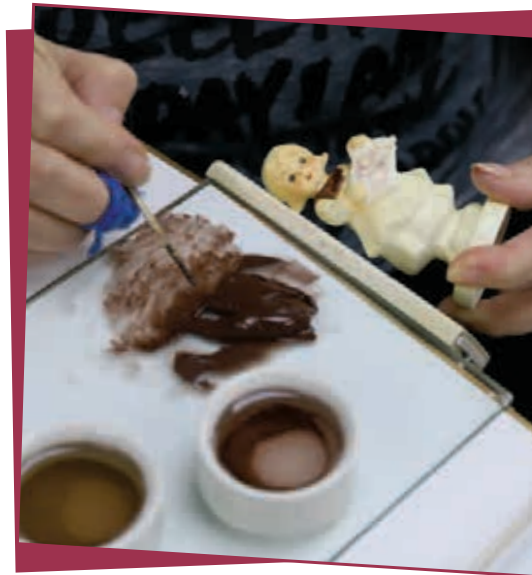

When Munich's senior mayor taps the first keg of beer in the Schottenhamel festival tent around noon on September 22, the largest and most famous fair in the world starts again: the Munich Oktoberfest. Until October 7, millions of visitors are expected from all over the world – not only from the neighboring countries Italy, Austria and Holland, but above all also from the USA, Japan and Australia. Approximately six million guests came in previous years, almost one in five from abroad.

They all come for the atmosphere, the tradition, the coziness, the pleasure in the Bavarian way of life and the hospitality – all combined in one historical place. But the popularity of the Oktoberfest can only partially be explained by this. You have to experience the unique atmosphere for yourself. A journalist wrote a few years ago: "Once you've been in the thick of it, you'll love it forever!" And a scientist trying to figure out the attractiveness of this famous fair, got this answer from one interviewee: "It wouldn't be a problem to set the Oktoberfest up somewhere else. But it wouldn't be the Oktoberfest. Ask anyone, this is a phenomenon that no one can explain." Nevertheless, it is copied, but none of these festivals anywhere else in

the world can match the original. The heart of the fair beats in 16 large and 22 smaller tents where guests can look forward to celebrating with beer and Bavarian specialties: From simple pretzels to the meat-loaf-like Leberkäs', knuckle of pork, roast chicken and ox on a spit to steamed noodles and Kaiserschmarrn, a sugared pancake with raisins. Last year, Oktoberfest visitors consumed 127 oxen and 59 calves, among other things. The days are long gone when guests could only order sausages and cheese and therefore brought their chicken from home to have it grilled at the fairground. But as always, only Munich beer is served – and plenty of it: Last year's visitors drank 7.5 million liters of beer, preferably one of

the specialties brewed especially for the Oktoberfest. More than a hundred different rides are fun for young and old alike: Romantics enjoy the fantastic view from the Ferris wheel. Brave lovers of breathtaking action will find challenges in numerous offers. Nostalgics who love the tunnel of horror, the devil's wheel or the chairplane, for example, also get their money's worth. Some of these historical rides are now only set up at the Oktoberfest in Munich. And – do we have to mention? – the Oktoberfest also lights up the eyes of little visitors with its numerous rides for children. Off we go!

Not a king or a minister laid the foundation stone for what is probably the world's most famous fair of today – it was a common member of the Bavarian National Guard. The man suggested celebrating the marriage of Ludwig of Bavaria and Princess Therese of

Saxony-Hildburghausen with a big horse race. King Max I. Joseph of Bavaria was thrilled. So five days after the wedding on October 17, 1810, the horses lined up for the race on Theresienwiese – Therese's Green – which is named after the bride.

Due to the huge demand, the breweries later erected large beer tents with bands in place of the small beer stalls. In the 20th century, more and more rides that were ever more exciting found their way to the Theresienwiese. The tradition of horse racing was not resumed after the Second

World War, with the exception of the 150th anniversary in 1960 and the 200th anniversary in 2010.

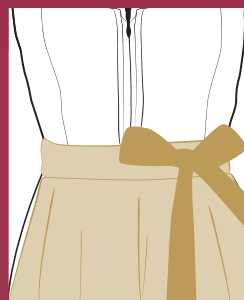

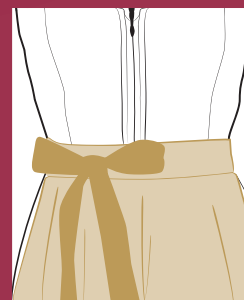

If the bow is tied on the left, the lady is single.



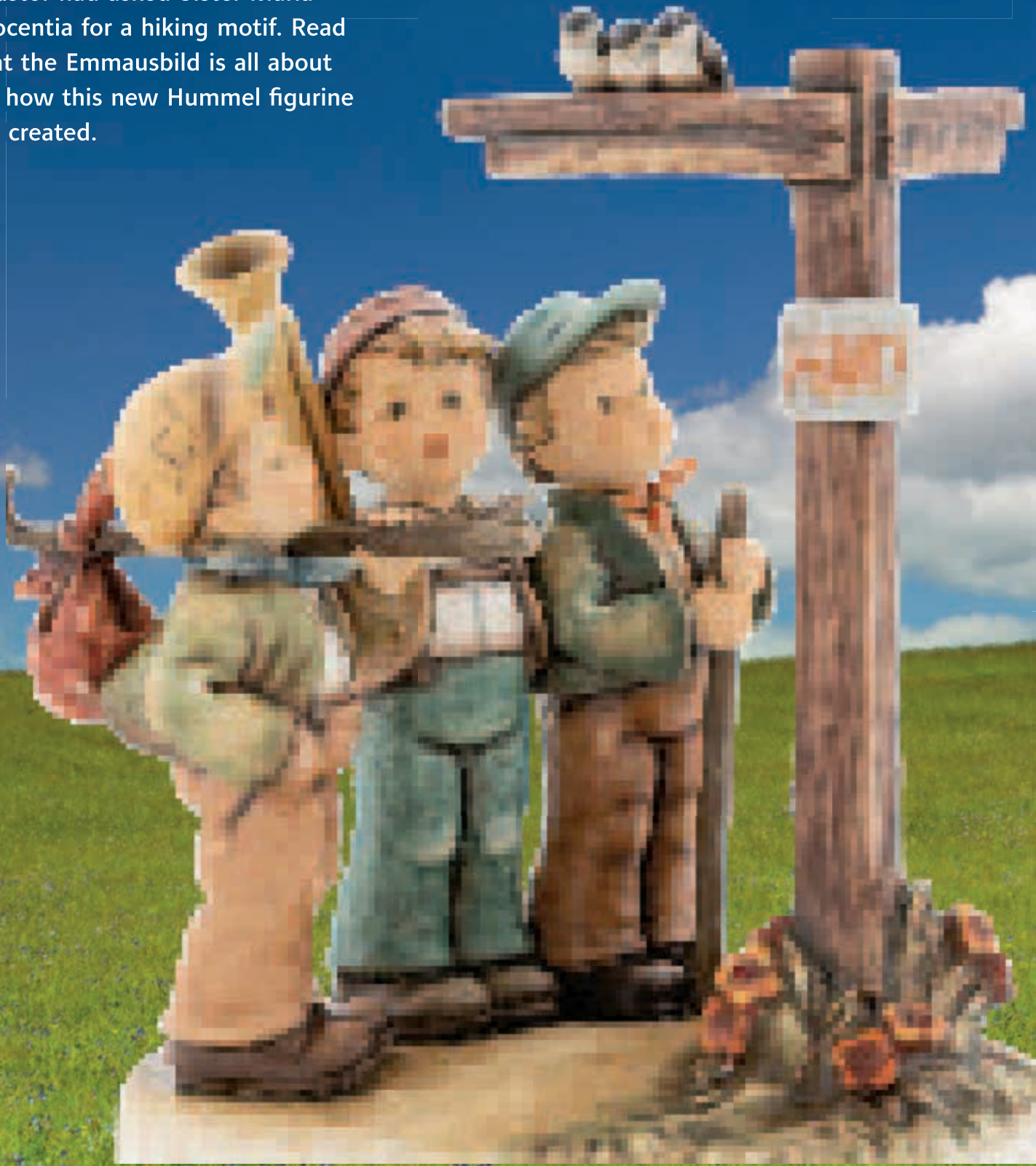
If the bow is on the right, then she is spoken for.

Excited about the art of Sister Maria Innocentia

A pastor had asked Sister Maria Innocentia for a hiking motif. Read what the Emmausbild is all about and how this new Hummel figurine was created.



Pastor Renz first met Sister M. Innocentia on March 21, 1938, at Sießen Convent.

The archives of the convent include a lively correspondence between the so-called Emmaus father and the sister. In a letter dated March 25, 1938, he writes: "Perhaps, I may tell you that I would also like you to send me an original that expresses the concept of hiking for my living room. Motif: Two disciples went to Emmaus."

The documents of Sießen Convent do not indicate how the contact between Pastor Renz and Sister Innocentia came about. The clergyman had obviously come into contact with her art and was enthusiastic about it. He commissioned several works from Sister Innocentia. The reason for his visit in March 1938 was the commission for altarpieces: a nativity scene for the Emmaus Chapel and two embroidered altar flags with worshiping angels as well as

a large oil altarpiece – a Madonna with Child – for the chapel of St. Michael, a place for homeless women. And also a Christ child for this facility – a forerunner of the Hummel-Christkind which was already discussed for production at that time – and that pastor Renz greatly encouraged Sister Innocentia to work on.

For Easter 1939, pastor Wilhelm Renz had greeting cards with the Emmaus motif printed exclusively for him by Ars sacra. On the

Where shall we go? The three little wanderers are looking up. The signpost, which serves as a resting place for three sparrows, seems to be unlabeled. Only a sign calling hikers to pause – as is also necessary sometimes in your life's journey to make sure you take the right path.

This new, elaborately designed Hummel figurine is based on the picture of the three traveling boys, which Sister Maria Innocentia published in the Hummel book of publishing house Josef Müller as a variation of an earlier motif. The original oil painting entitled "To Emmaus" was created for pastor Wilhelm Renz, the director of Emmausheim, a hostel for previously homeless people near Gundelfingen northeast of Ulm. The signpost then bears the inscription

"To Emmaus", which is no longer seen in the later drawing for the Hummel book.

Readers of the Hummel-Post were able to closely follow the development of the new Hummel figurine "Three Little Wanderers": from the master model from the hand of master sculptor Marion Huschka in issue 1 of this year to the precision work in model and mold making in issue 2 all the way to the now finished masterpiece from the Hummel Manufaktur.

back, they said: "We wish you a happy Easter and a happy Emmaus day in gratitude. On behalf of the homeless, Wilh. Renz, Director". On the front side below the image, there was a verse in Swabian dialect. Emmaus is a place near Jerusalem mentioned in the gospel of Luke (24:13) that Cleopas, a disciple of Jesus, came from. Luke

reports that Cleopas and another disciple went from Jerusalem to Emmaus the day after Passover in a dejected mood and met the risen Jesus without recognizing him. The unknown companion had interpreted the scriptures for them in a conversation. At the Last Supper, when he broke the bread, they recognized the risen Jesus in him and he

disappeared immediately afterwards. The same evening, they returned to Jerusalem to tell the apostles and the other disciples about the meeting. Emmaus means "warm spring" and was a common place name or name affix. The location of the biblical Emmaus is not known for sure.

In a Hummel book of publisher Josef Müller, Sister M. Innocentia released this drawing of the three little wanderers.



The “Emmaus father” **pastor Wilhelm Renz: A big heart for the needy**

Socially committed, courageous, energetic and endowed with a big heart – this is how Wilhelm Renz (1887 – 1960), the Emmaus father, would be described these days.

Pastor Renz was a member of the third order of St. Francis. He felt a deep love for the poor and needy. Neither denomination nor godlessness of his protégés mattered to him. In 1917, a home for previously homeless people, the Emmausheim, was

built on his initiative in the vicinity of Gundelfingen – despite a lot of resistance. In 1931, Wilhelm Renz purchased Schlachtegg Castle in Gundelfingen, which he turned into a home for homeless women. He called it St. Michael.

Today, the Emmaus house is sponsored by Caritas Augsburg. It offers two residential groups with 17 assisted living places for older people with disabilities. Schlachtegg Castle today serves as an educational center for florists. Ayurveda treatments are offered in the adjacent guest house.

Two boys with a special secret

In honor of master sculptor Gerhard Skrobek, the Hummel Manufaktur is issuing a series of six special figurines. After the prelude with "Summertime Surprise", Hummel lovers can now enjoy "Well Done!", the second figurine of the series. It surprises collectors with a special new detail.

What prank are the two boys thinking up? We will probably never find out, but we can imagine a few things: Stealing apples, building a secret lair in the woods or putting a live frog in the teacher's desk? Or perhaps they are whispering about the novelty from the Hummel Manufaktur. Because the two come out of the workshops with deep

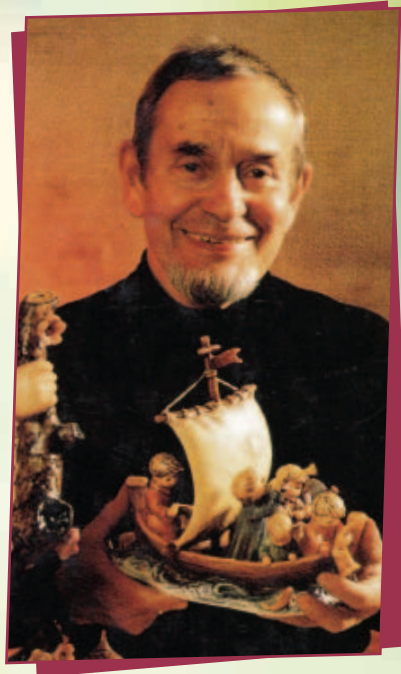

so far been strictly guarded as a possible future edition. The Skrobek edition will be continued in summer 2019. Collectors can then look forward to the third Hummel figurine of the series.

blue eyes! This has never before been done like this. Until now, Hummel figurines have always been given brown eyes. See for yourself: This gives the fine faces of the "bumblebees" a completely different, special and unique expression.

But the two boys know how to impress anyway: When sculptor Gerhard Skrobek designed the figurine with the number 400 in 1973, he succeeded in creating a small

masterpiece. He perfectly captured this familiar moment between two friends – one can almost imagine hearing them murmuring and whispering. "Skrobek has sculpted a highly complicated figurine rich in detail," decor developer Sabine Tzscheuschner confirms. "To distinguish them, that is to paint the faces, the figurines must therefore be partly turned upside down." The ivory color, which was previously applied for the white shirt resembling porcelain with

its sheen, provides a warm undertone for the "Hummels" and is now carefully washed off and removed again. Only then does the garment get its shine.

The painters pick up the figurine countless times at the Hummel workshops; a total of 21 different colors are used. The experts apply the basic color for each of the 25 stages. Let's

take a closer look at one step: The painters use the basic Hummel green for the long pants. Another color is used for shading and pleating. Finally, the painters work out the typical Hummel structure with a special stippling brush made of pig bristles, called "Stupper", and soften the transitions. They make protruding areas brighter to enhance the depth effect.

The master model, a positive cast of the original master mold, comes from the archive and has

THE FRANCISCUS GARDEN IN SIESEN CONVENT

Close to 
creation

A wonderful place to rest,
to breathe a sigh of relief,
to let go and finally be
yourself: The Franciscus
Garden of Sießen Convent
impresses with its quiet
beauty.

Visitors are looking for relaxation and go for walks here today.

Groups use the special atmosphere for therapeutic purposes. Old fruit trees used to stand here until the Franciscan sisters of Sießen redesigned the grounds into the publicly accessible Franciscus Garden in 2004. It takes its name from St. Francis of Assisi, according to whose spirituality and religious rule the Sisters live.

The spacious complex is based on the verses of the famous "Canticle of the Sun", a song of praise by St. Francis. He sees himself on the same level as the creatures. He feels them praising the Creator and gives them a voice. The hymn is one of the most famous prayers of the Catholic Church. In 2015, Pope Francis named his environmental encyclical "Laudato si" after the first words of the prayer. For we are not to be exploiters of Mother Earth, but siblings who must respect our planet as much as our bodily brothers and sisters. Thus, the Franciscan Garden should also be a place that invites one to be close to creation. It is the wish of the Sisters of Sießen to enable visitors to come closer to themselves and to the Creator who can be sensed behind them – just as Francis himself expressed it in his poetry.

The "Canticle of the Sun" sings of Brother Sun, the Sisters Moon,

Water, Air and "Mother" Earth with its flowers and herbs. In Italian and Latin, the sun is male (il sole), the moon female (la luna). That is why Brother Sun and Sister Moon are mentioned in the Franciscus Garden of Sießen.

The various design elements of the facility invite you to a voyage of discovery: For example, a water spring, the human sundial, a labyrinth, the herb garden, the bee house, a fireplace, a pond, a portion of forest and a small chapel as well as "Brother Death" can be seen – an impressive little building that first leads visitors into complete darkness and then, after another step, amazes them with bright rays of light through a small slit in the ceiling.

Francis probably wrote the "Canticle of the Sun" shortly before his death, at the end of 1224 or the beginning of 1225, when he lay seriously ill and almost blind in San Damiano near Assisi. In it, he calls man to praise God in all his creatures. The authenticity is attested with a biography.

The song was written by Francis of Assisi in a high medieval Umbrian dialect. Unlike most of his lyrics, the Umbrian vernacular version of the "Canticle of the Sun" has been preserved. Poetry in the vernacular was still highly unusual in the Italian culture of that time. The "Song of the Sun" is therefore considered the oldest testimony of Italian literature.

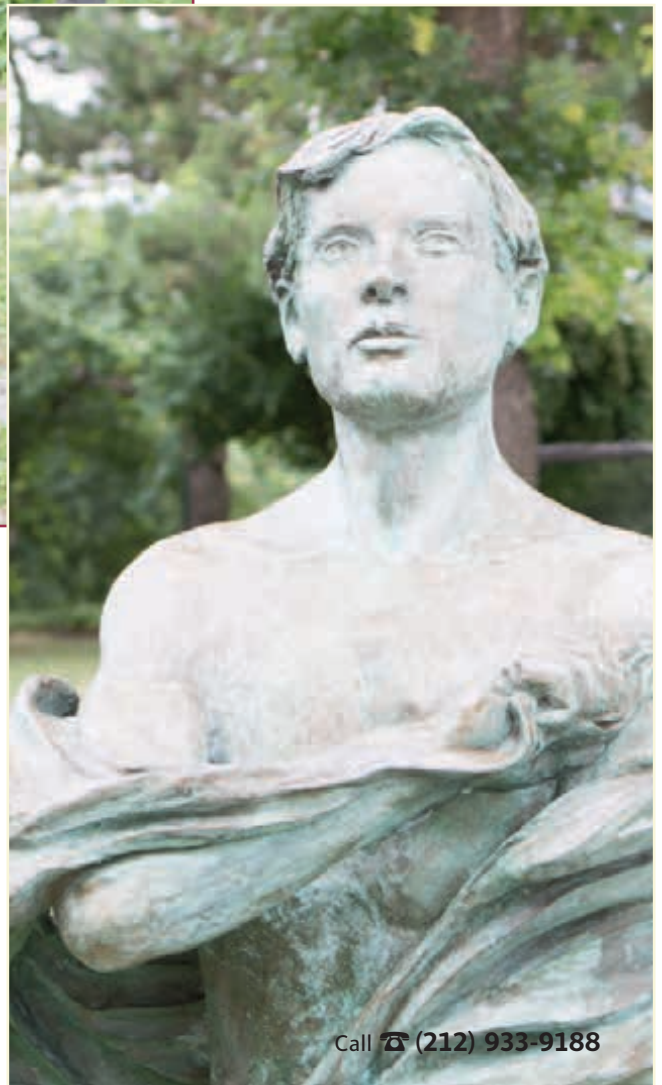

Sießen Convent –

**WHERE SISTER M.
INNOCENTIA FOUND
HER FULFILLMENT**



Sießen Convent today preserves the legacy of Sister Maria Innocentia Hummel whose expressive children's drawings laid the foundation for the lovable Hummel figurines. The artist entered the convent in April 1931 and took her vows on August 30, 1934. After a serious illness, she died in 1946 at the age of only 37. Sießen Convent remembers Sister M. Innocentia with a permanent exhibition in the Hummelsaal showing images of children, watercolors, portraits and religious art.

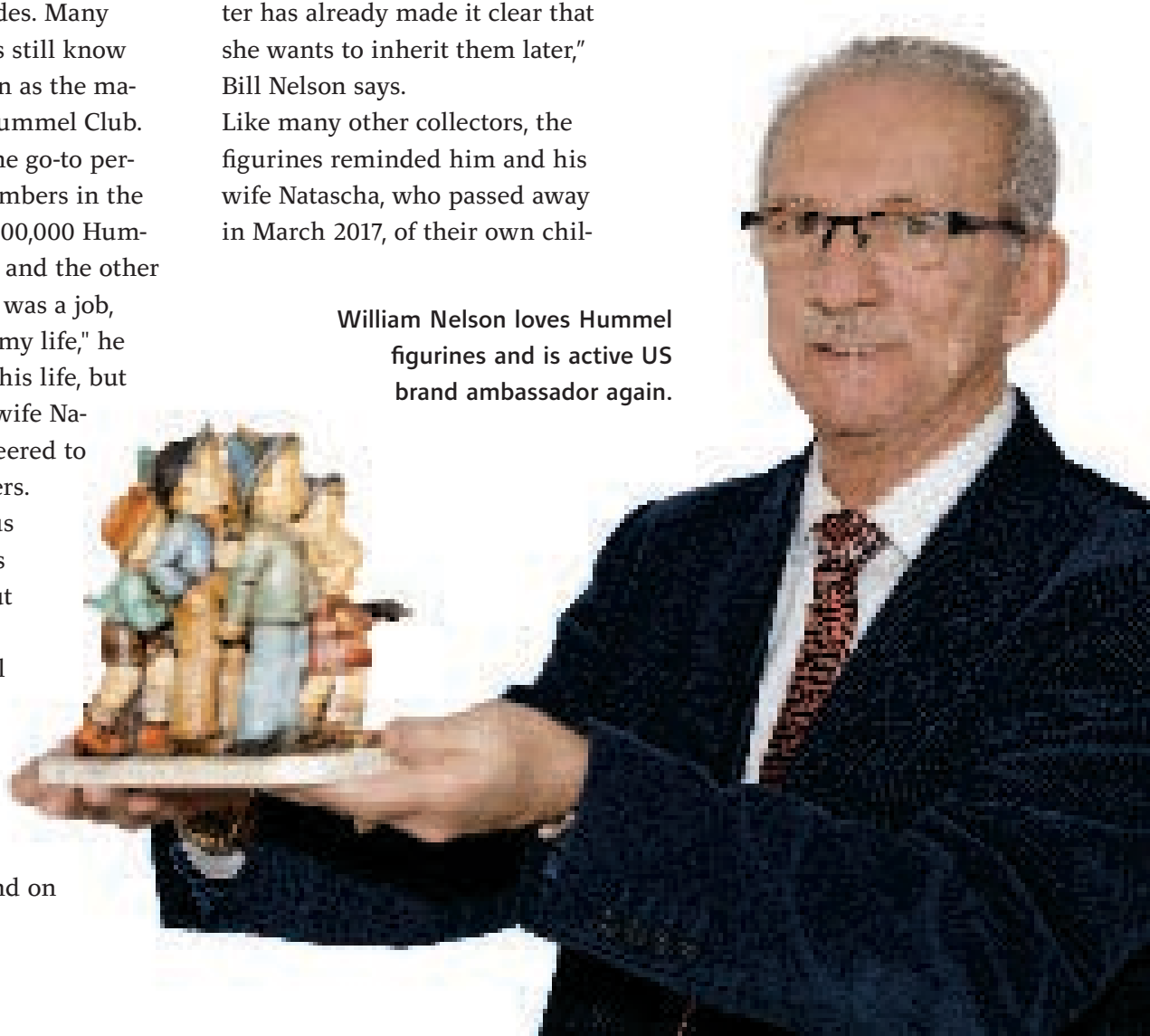
Many collectors still know him as the Hummel Club manager. But William Nelson also likes having "Hummels" around in his private home. He talks about his favorite pieces here and his decades of passion for the small figurines.

Hardly anyone could work for the Hummel Manufaktur and not fall in love with the Hummel figurines. William Nelson couldn't either. The lovely Hummel children have managed to captivate the former US soldier for decades. Many long-time collectors still know the native American as the manager of the M.I. Hummel Club. "Bill" Nelson was the go-to person for 200,000 members in the United States and 100,000 Hummel fans in Europe and the other continents. "First it was a job, then it was part of my life," he says. And not only his life, but also the life of his wife Natascha, who volunteered to assist Hummel lovers. The "Hummels" thus shaped not only his professional life, but also conquered his home. The Hummel fan does not know exactly how many figurines there are to be admired in show-cases, cupboards and on

the shelves: "They could easily number more than 300," the 73-year-old suspects. His son-in-law once registered them all to get an overview of the treasures. And the figurines will stay in the family in the future: "My daughter has already made it clear that she wants to inherit them later," Bill Nelson says. Like many other collectors, the figurines reminded him and his wife Natascha, who passed away in March 2017, of their own chil-

dren. He particularly likes figurine HUM 451 "Just Dozing", sculpted by Gerhard Skrobek: "Our son was just like that. He could sit down anywhere and sleep peacefully," he says.

William Nelson loves Hummel figurines and is active US brand ambassador again.



"Always bought what we liked"

He has reserved a special place on a sideboard for the figurine of a saluting soldier he received from Goebel on his 60th birthday. It is decorated with an English plaque honoring his work as a Hummel ambassador. The large "Goose Girl" (HUM 47) and the corresponding Hummel drawing next to it are another delight. "We always bought what we liked," he says. As a doll and bear lover, Natascha Nelson also added the Hummel Teddy Bear, who carries a little Hummel girl in his pocket, to her collection.

Coincidence lead him to Hummel

How does a former US soldier become Hummel Club manager and Hummel lover? When William Nelson was first stationed with the Army in Kassel in 1966, he met his great love Natascha there. She didn't speak English. He spoke almost no German. The attraction to each other was stronger than any language problems: They not only got to know each other, but also the language of the other. They got married in 1967 and a soldier's life followed:

"We moved 25 times in 20 years of marriage," Bill Nelson says.

In 1980, the US Armed Forces sent him to Coburg as liaison officer. He started to feel at home there and did not want to move anymore.

When Goebel was looking for an employee speaking perfect

English to look after the US collectors, the head of marketing at the time took notice of him. And for William Nelson as the new head of the Hummel Club and the Info Service a varied and exciting time began: "No two days were the same," he says in retrospect. Today, he is back on board, is involved as US brand ambassador and has an ear for the concerns of English-speaking collectors. "Welcome back, Bill."

"Blessed Event" finds a new home



A woman from Munich by chance discovers a lovingly embroidered Hummel picture in a second-hand department store and gives it to the Hummel Manufaktur. Because she thinks: It should bring joy where the Hummel figurines have their home.

When Isolde Amann-Geiger discovered this picture in the second-hand department store, she knew: "I have to buy this." Five children gather around the cradle and marvel at the newborn sibling. Sister Maria Innocentia had called this work "Nesthäkchen". When she saw the elaborately embroidered motif, she immediately liked this "gem in the great passe-partout" and recognized the Hummel motif right away, the 68-year-old explains. "Hummel cards have accompanied me through my childhood. The favorite item in my collection was the child under the umbrella," the Munich native reports.



Isolde Amann-Geiger came across an embroidered picture with a Hummel motif. "I liked it right away," she says.

She herself does not own any "Hummels" anymore. Many years ago, she had to sell her figurines to an antique shop in Schwabing because of financial difficulties, she commiserates and adds: "But I still like the lovely Hummel figurines very much." After enjoying the embroidery at home for a few days, Isolde Amann-Geiger found that the work should go back to where the Hummel figurines have their home: the Hummel Manufaktur. And so Hummel employees can now admire the lovingly embroi-

dered work in the offices of the Rödentaler Manufaktur. "I enjoy giving pleasure to others," says the Munich-based artist – very much like Sister Maria Innocentia, the creator of the Hummel pictures. And like her, Isolde Amann-Geiger is a creative artist: Not as a painter, but as the author of stories, verses and songs for adults and children.

Our annual angel gets its finishing touches from Stefanie Schuhmann in the painting department. The trained ceramic painter provides the wings of the angel with gold bronze decoration. The figurine has already gone through the kiln: The gold is so sensitive, it would simply be scorched during the firing and the beautiful, shiny effect would be gone. "That is why this color is not burned with the rest," she explains.



The tradition of the annual angels will be continued in 2018 with the "Angel of Love". He joins the "Angel of Faith" from 2017. Together with the "Angel of Hope", which will be released next year, the three figurines illustrate the well-known Bible verse from the Song of Songs in the 1st letter to the Corinthians. It is often chosen as a marriage vow:

"And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love."

(1. Corinthians 13, 13)

Faith, hope and love are considered theological or divine virtues. They are described as "poured" into the soul of the faithful by God. They therefore describe inner attitudes rather than instructions for action. But we are sure: Even without theological knowledge, the elaborately designed and painted annual angels will delight all viewers.



The gold bronze is ready mixed, three copies of the annual angel are waiting for completion and appraisal. Another piece already has a pendant. It was created by decor developer Sabine Tzscheuschner and is a perfect sample and model for all other annual angels that are produced.

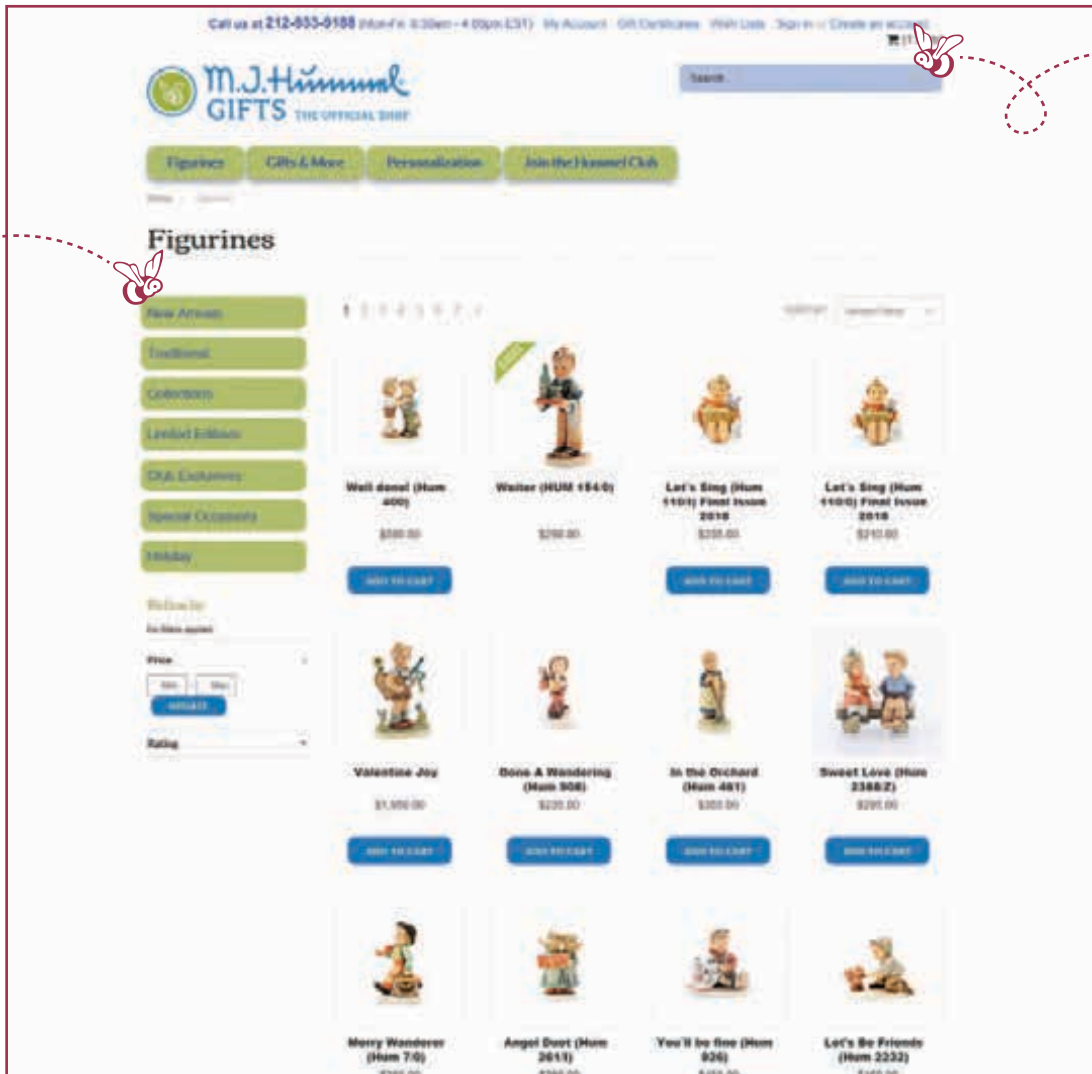

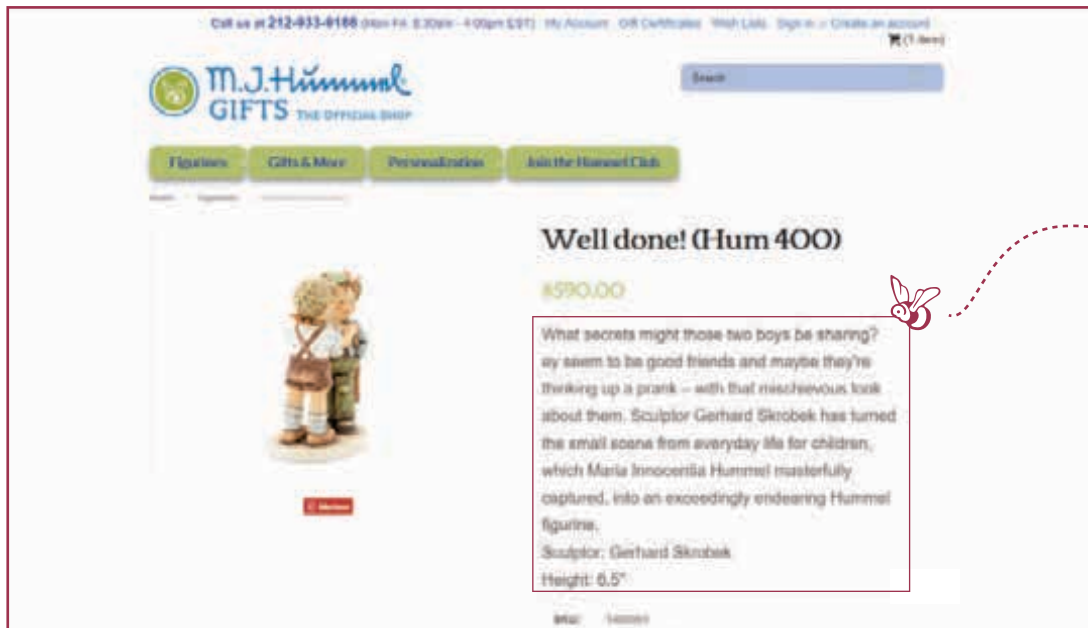

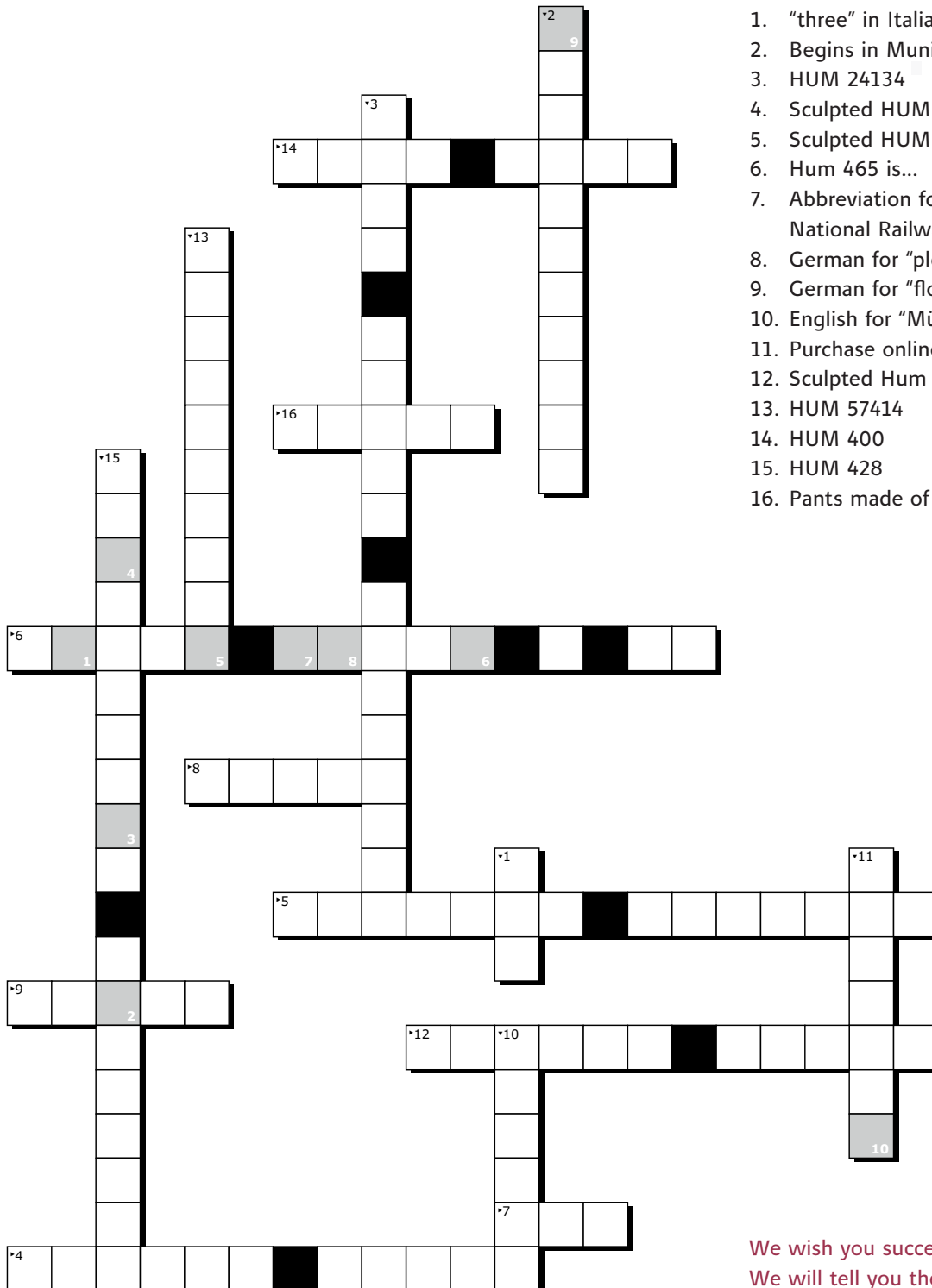

Mixed salad with paprika chicken

INGREDIENTS for 2 portions

300 g salad mix or
green salad to taste
100 g cherry tomatoes
80 g corn (can)
5 tbsp natural yogurt, 3.5 % fat
1 bag of a spicy garden herbs mix
200 g chicken breast
Sweet paprika powder
Iodized salt, pepper
2 tbsp oil

PREPARATION

1. Wash salad and cherry tomatoes. Halve or quarter the tomatoes. Drain the corn. Put everything in a bowl. Mix the contents of the herb bag first with one tablespoon of warm water and then with the yogurt. Pour the dressing over the salad and mix well.
2. Wash the chicken breast, dab dry and cut into strips. Season with paprika, salt and pepper and fry in hot oil. Then pour over the salad. White bread goes well with this.



Feel-good food for hot days

During the hot summer, nobody wants to work near the stove for long. Our recipe is prepared in no time and light enough so that you can round off the delicious menu with ice cream or a fruit salad. If you regularly reach for a glass of water during the day, you will feel completely comfortable in the summer as well.



Don't get parched this summer

Drink enough and eat the right food: The higher the temperatures, the more important it becomes. The fluid intake is especially important. If you want to stay fit in the summer, you have to drink enough. Because water helps the body regulate its temperature and keep the circulation going. Deficits can manifest themselves as dizziness, fatigue or headaches. Our tips:

Drink enough:

At least 1.5 to two liters a day. Forgetful people: Place the water bottle in your field of vision or have an app remind you.

We look back to the 1938

1938 was a fruitful year for the Goebel Porzellanfabrik: The company's sculptors were creating a whole series of new figurines. Look back with us on interesting events of 1938, which are still close to us today.



FOUR-LEGGED SERIAL HEROINE: MOVIE STAR LASSIE IS "BORN"

She has a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame and has been loved for generations: Movie dog "Lassie". On December 17, 1938, writer Eric Knight published a first short story in an American weekly magazine about the faithful collie which went on to enjoy decades of fame. Next to many films, the television series "Lassie" was produced for almost 20 years – from 1954 to 1973 – during which the intelligent dog rescued her human friends from all kinds of dangers.

BETTER WRITING: THE INGENIOUS IDEA OF INK AND A BALL

Ready to write at any time, drip-proof and inexpensive: We owe the invention of the ballpoint pen to Hungarian László József Bíró. In 1938, he had his idea patented in his home country: a pen with a newly developed ink with a ball at the tip. From 1950 onwards, the writing tool began its worldwide triumph. In Great Britain, Italy, France and Argentina, the pen is named after its inventor Bíró these days.

NEW TOOTHBRUSHES: SCRUBBING WITH NYLON BRISTLES

The toothbrush with plastic bristles as we know it today was born on February 24, 1938. On this day, American company DuPont produced the first toothbrushes with bristles made of the newly developed material nylon.

But the idea of a toothbrush with handle and bristle part is much older: It was invented by physician Christoph von Hellwig around 1700 in the Thuringian city of Bad Tennstedt. A toothbrush memorial today remembers him.

SHIP LEGEND: QUEEN ELIZABETH WAS LAUNCHED

For more than half a century, it was the world's largest passenger ship on the oceans: the RMS Queen Elizabeth. It was launched on December 27, 1938. After the Second World War, the passenger ship dominated the transatlantic route until the shipping company decommissioned it in 1969. The RMS Queen Elizabeth came into the limelight for the last time in 1974: The wreck serves as the backdrop for a James Bond movie.

During the post-war period, Goebel Porzellanfabrik released a series of Hummel figurines that have turned into real classics and are loved to this day: among them the "Little Goat Herder", "Telling Her Secret" or "Retreat to safety".

COMFY COUCH TIME: SWITCHING CHANNELS WITHOUT GETTING UP
Resting comfortably on the couch and switching channels – this comfort taken for granted today has its origin in the first remote control which was introduced in the USA in 1948. A cable still connected the remote control to the TV set. The first wireless remote control followed in 1955 – not yet technically sophisticated though: Often, daylight alone was enough to switch on the TV. This did not change until one year later when ultrasound technology was used. In Germany, TV remote controls with various functions were available from 1959.

NEW MOVIE AWARD:
"BAMBI" STILL WITHOUT A NAME
Marika Röck and Stewart Granger were the first winners in the category "Most Popular Actors" of the Bambi movie awards which were first given out in 1948. Marika Röck's little daughter is said to have given the then nameless award its name because it reminded her of the deer from Felix Salten's book "Bambi". Among the record winners were Heinz Rühmann (12), Peter Alexander, O. W. Fischer and Johannes Heesters (10).



NEW INSTANT CAMERAS: PHOTOS WITHOUT THE LAB

It was a sensation 70 years ago: A camera that "spits out" a fully developed photo in 60 seconds. From November 1948 on, Polaroid cameras rolled off the production line in the US and soon sold by the millions. Even today, despite – or because of – digital photography, many lovers of instant cameras appreciate the authentic snapshot, the unique copy.

1968

The innovations of the year were designed by master sculptor Gerhard Skrobek. Besides "Angel Duet", these are three young musicians who are occasionally also called "Little Band": "Girl with Sheet Music", "Boy with Accordion" and "Girl with Trumpet".

"ZUR SACHE, SCHÄTZCHEN" [GO FOR IT, BABY] LURES MILLIONS INTO MOVIE THEATERS

In 1968, the film "Zur Sache, Schätzchen" with Uschi Glas playing the female lead was a great success. The flick even influenced colloquial language with, among other things, terms like "Dumpfbacke" [dimwit] or "tüllich" as a short form of "naturally". 6.5 million people in Germany watched the movie. At the 1968 German movie awards "Bundesfilmpreis", male lead Werner Enke was honored as the best up-and-coming actor. He and director May Spills also received the Golden Film Tape in the specially created category "Dialogs".



OPEL CAUSES A SENSATION WITH THE SPORTY GT

"Only flying is better" – was the advertising slogan car manufacturer Opel has been using to advertise its new model Opel GT since 1968.

It soon became a common saying. With its sporty, sleek design, which did not match the previous conservative image of Opel, it caused a sensation. Around 104,000 GTs were sold, more than half of them in the US. To this day, the car has many fans and is admired at classic car events.

THE NEW VAT STARTS AT 10 PERCENT

The value added tax, which was introduced in the Federal Republic of Germany on January 1, 1968, amounted to 10 percent. The new tax replaced a VAT procedure in which companies had to pay taxes at every level of trade. They were unable to recover the input tax. VAT has been raised in six steps to its current rate

of 19 percent. Food, books and magazines were taxed less from the outset.

BOEING 747: A JUMBO CONQUERS THE SKY

For decades, it has been the world's largest passenger plane in air traffic: the Jumbo jet.



In 1968, Boeing introduced the 747. With a length of over 70 meters and a wingspan of around 60 meters, it rightly deserves the nickname "Jumbo jet". The first model had a range of almost 10,000 kilometers and could carry up to 550 passengers. Only in 2005, the Airbus 380 finally outstripped the Jumbo jet as the world's largest passenger aircraft.

1988

This year, collectors and lovers of Hummel figurines can delight in a whole series of newly designed figurines by the two master sculptors Gerhard Skrobek and Helmut Fischer. Some of the models will later be released as club figurines.



SPEED RECORD ON THE TRACK: 406.9 KM/H

On May 1, ICE predecessor InterCity-Experimental traveled at more than 400 kilometers per hour setting a new speed record for rail vehicles. At 11:12 a.m., the train reached a record speed of 406.9 km/h north of the Einmalberg tunnel in Sinntal valley with about 80 passengers, among them ministers, board members of the German Federal Railways and media representatives. Until then, the French TGV had been the fastest train, but it regained the title on December 5, 1989, with more than 480 km/h.

THE GERMAN STOCK INDEX IS LAUNCHED

The German stock index (DAX), which measures the performance of the 30 largest companies of the German stock market, was introduced on July 1, 1988. For December 31, 1987, it was standardized to 1,000 index points. At the beginning of June 2014, it exceeded 10,000 points for the first time. The DAX was initially not intended as a competition but

as a supplement to already established German stock indices. It has since left the other indices behind and is nationally and internationally recognized as the leading index for the German stock market.

TENNIS PLAYER STEFFI GRAF MANAGES THE "GOLDEN SLAM"

As the first German and third tennis player ever, Steffi Graf won all Grand Slam tournaments in one year with her victory over Gabriela Sabatini at the US Open on September 10. A few weeks later, she won a gold medal at the Summer Olympics in Seoul, South Korea. She thus achieved the so-called "Golden Slam".

THE GENETIC FINGERPRINT IS RECOGNIZED IN COURT

Hardly a TV thriller without a genetic fingerprint. And in real life, DNA serial tests regularly make headlines. In Germany, the procedure was first recognized as evidence in criminal proceedings in court in 1988. Englishman Colin Pitchfork was the first person to be convicted with DNA testing in 1987 and sentenced in January 1988. He had raped and murdered two girls. The distinctive genetic fingerprint was discovered by Alec Jeffreys on September 10, 1984. He still calls this his eureka moment.

THE FIRST COMPUTER WORM CRIPPLES TEN PERCENT OF THE INTERNET

Robert T. Morris, an American computer scientist, programmed the first computer worm for the Internet in 1988 and released it on November 2. The so-called Morris worm crippled about 6,000 computers. At that time, this corresponded to about ten percent of the global network. The development of computer worms stagnated until the mid-1990s. The reason: The Internet did not yet have the reach it has today.
