





This counterpart to the figurine "Apple Tree Boy" was sculpted 1940 by Arthur Moeller and has often been redesigned. There are very many size variations and older figures are characterized by a brown base. In the smaller models no bird sits on the tree. It is a very well-known figurine that has also been used for annual plates, lamps and bookends.

As Hummel lovers know, Maria Innocentia Hummel was a spring child. She was born on May 21, 1909, in Massing. It is only fitting that in all the decades of their history Hummel figurines have stood for one thing above all else: the joy of life.

This figure was sculpted in January 1967 by Gerhard Skrobek and introduced 1972 for the first time on the American market. There have been no major changes in size, color or design.

Fit for spring - it's easy!

EAT LIGHTER: In spring, light meals are preferable – lots of vegetables and fruits. Rhubarb and wild garlic, strawberries and asparagus. And the food should be garnished with as many

powerful. That's why: Apply sun screen, remembering the backs of your hands, neck and forearms, which are often forgotten. This also applies to your ears, where relatively often

precursors to skin cancer can form. If you have a bald head, you

should also cream your head well (at least SPF 30, better even 50). Don't let yourself be fooled by the wind. In the spring, it is usually still cool, but that does not change the sunlight. You can get a sunburn from March to May without even realizing it. Don't forget lip protection!

Spring time means **HAY FEVER TIME** for many. When the pollen fly from alder, hazel and birch, eyes itch and noses run. But help against the symptoms is readily available at low cost in the pharmacy. An independent German foundation tested several common remedies for hay fever last spring and determined that many

can provide effective relief. Eye drops can help when the eyes are affected, as well as nasal spray for the nose. Often, however, only antihistamines, which are available as tablets, juices and syrups will relieve symptoms. And don't forget your family physician!

In Germany, there are many lucky symbols, such as the chimney sweep. Whoever touches the "sweep", as he is also called in Bavaria, has good luck for the rest of the year. So, they say ... This belief goes back to the Middle Ages. At that time, the chimney sweep made for a clean chimney, so that you could pre-

> pare hot meals and heat the room. The danger of a house fire was reduced. The positive associations with the chimney sweep probably led to the people seeing in him a lucky charm.

"Had a pig"!

The pig is another German lucky charm. No one really knows what this is all about or why it is so popular in this country, but nevertheless: The lucky pig is firmly anchored in German tradition. It is believed that the story of the pig dates back to times when, because of their meat, the animals were a valuable possession and their owners were considered wealthy. The saying that someone "had a pig", if luck is meant, fits

The opening to the top!

It may surprise you, but there are several explanations for the horseshoe as a lucky charm. For example, it is often associated with stagecoaches, which in former times carried love letters. When one finally held such an eagerly awaited letter in his hands, the feeling of happiness must have been indescribable. Another explanation goes back to a legend, according to which the horseshoe was nailed to the devil's hoofed foot and only removed when he promised to do no more

> mischief. Important for the owner of a horseshoe: always attach it with the opening upwards, so that the luck can't fall out. As you can see, luck has many facets. And now it's

on its way to you, too. A new Hummel series with the theme of luck is being launched. "My Little Horseshoe" shows a young girl pressing a horseshoe to her

heart. "Feelin' Lucky" is a chimney sweep carrying a pig in his arms and holding a shamrock in his hand – quasi a triple dose of luck! We hope you will welcome these figurines into your home and bring an extra dose of luck into your life!

The luck series has arrived. You are the lucky one!

The Hummel sculptors Anette Barth and Tamara Fuchs, together, created the first two figurines of the new luck series. Anette modeled "My Little Horseshoe" and paid particular attention to the design of the horseshoe – it had to be carefully sculpted, but not covered by the girl's hand. This particular detail was carefully modeled with great care. You will like that! Seventeen colors make up the beautiful color design of the figurine. When painting the curls, the paint is applied with different levels of pressure, which creates different strengths in the brushstrokes.

"Feelin' Lucky" presented Tamara some challenges as she modeled the figure, because she had to add more elements. Nine different molds were needed. The result is a particularly precious figurine, for a number of reasons, but especially since after 82 years this is only the second chimney sweep to be released as a figurine. For the chimney sweep's deep black suit, the painters use special shading techniques to achieve a realistic, three-dimensional effect. The lucky pig's face gets its perfect look with the help of a fine feather brush.







How humblebees learn The people behind the figurines

Millions of people around the world know and love the enchanting children with their happy faces. What many do not know: How much love, patience and years of experience are needed to turn the original drawings of Sister Maria Innocentia Hummel into the famous Hummel figurines from Rödental.



Each Hummel figurine is based on the original drawings by Berta Hummel, who changed her name to Maria Innocentia (M.I.) Hummel after joining the Franciscan convent at Siessen. The first Hummel figures, including the "Puppy Love" (HUM 1), were still approved by her personally. Since Maria Innocentia's death in 1946,

the convent has been administering her artistic legacy, making sure that all Hummel figurines retain the unique characteristics of the original drawings.



To create a figurine from a drawing, first of all you need clay, a soft, particularly plastic clay that can be worked well (kneaded) and one that does not dry out too quickly. From this, the first model is formed.





3. Presentation at the convent of Siessen

Now the clay model can be presented for the first examination at the Siessen convent. Do the looks of the eyes, the hair fit, are the proportions correct? Only when the figurine corresponds to the aesthetics of the original drawing do the Franciscan sisters approve the model.

4. The details

Once the first formalities have been completed, the details of the clay model are completed by the sculptors. At the present, the Hummel Manufaktur employs three sculptors, among them the well-known master Marion Huschka (right).



5. The parts

Hummel figurines cannot be cast in one piece. After modeling, they are therefore cut into individual parts. The more complicated the figure and the more movement in it, the more individual pieces that will have to be put together later. This is done so carefully and precisely that only experts know where the seams are located.

6. Pour the sample


When the setup is complete, and the model is finished, the first – for Hummel a total of twelve – working samples are poured. These sample molds are also called "mother molds."



7. The color sample

Once the first samples have been cast, they are painted by the sample painter with great care and attention to detail, which is also called "decorating." Sample painter Sabine Tzscheuschner (left) is preparing the first colored samples, which will subsequently again go through the acceptance process at the Siessen convent.

8. The working mold

If everything with the figurine is correct, then finally the working molds can be produced for the figurine's production.





9. The casting

The molds are now filled with the so-called slip, a mixture of kaolin, quartz, feldspar and water (top). After drying, the soft cast part is carefully released from the mold (bottom) and the up to 40 individual parts are assembled.

10. The firing

It's going to get hot now: The airdried figures disappear into one of the huge kilns and are first fired at 1,140 degrees C. This firing gives the figurine its hardness, but at the same time it loses eight percent of its mass.

When the firing process is finished, the characteristic backstamp is applied. It is a statement of quality, a business card and a dating help all at the same time and in addition shows the serial number of limited edition figurines.


12. The Painting

Once the figurine has cooled, it can be painted and brought to life. Team leader Annett Michel ensures that all the figures end up with the same magical appearance.

13. The décor firing

With every Hummel figurine first the eyes, eyelashes, eyebrows and mouth are painted. Then the faces receive a warm skin and cheek color and the figurines are fired at 640 degrees C. Once the on-glaze paint and the glaze have merged, the remainder of the figurine is painted, and it is fired again. In this process, the color is permanently fused to the figure.

Little Three Wanderers

The motif was first used by Maria Innocentia around 1938 in an oil painting for Pastor Wilhelm Renz, the founder and director of the Emmaus home for the homeless. In a later drawing published in the Hummel Book (Hummelbuch) from the publishing house Josef Müller, the original inscription on the signpost "To Emmaus" is no longer shown. The lack of reference to the right path is addressed in a verse accompanying the drawing.





Nature's Cross

Anette Barth sculpted a summit cross, atypically without a boy or girl. It is a truly detailed piece that fits perfectly to "Heavenly Bouquet" (Hum No. 918) and "My Edelweiss" (Hum No. 2395).

Birds of a Feather

Matching "Just Ducky" (Hum No. 2393), the 2018 Hummel collection also introduces "Birds of a Feather". The young boy, distinguished by precision handcraftsmanship, holds two ducklings. The animals are particularly noticeable with their glossy white color created by a special production process. Like some other figurines, the boy wears typical Bavarian leather pants (Lederhose). The creator of the artistic works leading to the figurines, Convent Sister Maria Innocentia Hummel, was from Bavaria.

Convent of Siessen

t is still early in the morning, as the small group of tourists drives through the gate to the parking lot of the convent. The air is cool, but not cold. Just enough that the snow of recent days on the rooves and paths does not thaw and creates a calm winter mood, as is only possible with very old and large buildings. The Siessen convent, with its many structures and a good 800-year tradition, has both. The bright facades keep the complex from being intimidating but make it friendly and even inviting to its visitors. The sun, now pushing carefully through the clouds, also evokes a pleasant illumination.


The impression from outside continues inside the buildings with their high ceilings and whitewashed walls. The hallways seem endless and only Sister Emanuela keeps us from getting lost. "Here we go," says the Franciscan smiling and leads us past countless paintings into a small chapel. The pictures as well as parts of the devotional room

with its ornately carved altar come from Sister Sigmunda May, who died in 2017, a well-known artist like Maria Innocentia Hummel, also known far beyond the convent walls.

"We Franciscans live in the community, but we also promote the identity of each individual," explains Sister Emanuela. For example, a co-sister also worked as a senior physician and Sister Sigmunda was not only an artist, but also taught as an art teacher. It's a real challenge to coordinate all the different schedules. However, they want to go with the times, reveals our hostess and enters the festival room with an image of the Knight Steinmar von Siessen-Strahlegg above the door. From him, Dominican nuns received the monas-

tery in 1260 as a gift, since 1860 it has been used by the Franciscan sisters. In the middle of the room a golden rose is attached to the ceiling. "It is said that what is said under the rose also remains under the rose", explains our companion and leads us into a small choir room, whose window front provides a wonderful view into the interior of the adjacent Baroque monastery church. When the windows are open, cold air escapes from the interior of the church into the sanctuary. The church is not heated and is therefore not used in winter. This is energy-efficient and also helps ensure that the artistically designed frescoes have not suffered any damage over the many years. Energy efficiency in the convent?

Saint Francis: At the gate entrance, a statue commemorates the founder of the Franciscan order. The cloak left behind symbolizes the poverty ideal.





Tradition and the modern – the convent kitchen still emphasizes loving manual work. However, machines now do the dishes.

"Of course, we pay attention to the running costs," says Sister Emanuela. And the lower they are, the more is left for the main concern of the Franciscan Sisters of Siessen: service to their fellow human beings. In addition to the traditional focus on girls' education, many sisters practice a therapeutic profession, do pastoral work, work in youth welfare

and youth work, and care for the sick. Since 2015, the motherhouse in Siessen, in a part of the house of St. Angela, has also been providing space for refugees from war zones such as Syria and Iraq. Despite all these many areas of effort and work, we do not meet any sister on this day without a smile. Where does her joy come from, we ask one of them. "Because deep down I know that

I belong here." Who would not like to be able to say that about themselves? Passing the Franciscan Garden and the cemetery with the final resting place of Maria Innocentia, we enter the Hummel hall, where many, also less known, works are exhibited.

As our farewell approaches and we pass the convent gate in the direction of Bad Saulgau, the sky has become cloudy. A dismal gray is spreading. The convent, however, is still friendly and welcoming. Because of the bright facades – but especially because of its inhabitants.

Guided tours in the Siessen Convent

The convent offers visitors guided tours on various topics, including the baroque church of St. Mark by Dominicus Zimmermann and the convent's history. A permanent exhibition in the Hummel hall displays – alongside well-known pictures by M.I. Hummel – also less well-known works of art.

Open: weekdays, 10-12 a.m. and 2-4 p.m. Sundays & Holidays: 2-4:30 p.m. Closed: Mondays and on the 1st Sunday of the month.

Admission is free, but every visitor is welcome to donate. Groups – with or without a guided tour – are requested to register in advance.

That's what Maria Innocentia Hummel once wrote. And she is still doing it today, more than 70 years after her early death in 1946. Millions of people around the world find joy day after day in the lovable Hummel figures that manifest her expressive drawings of children.



Hummel figurines bring happy, carefree children's days to life, which may well have been the childhood that was experienced by little Berta Hummel, the born name of Maria Innocentia, in Massing in Lower Bavaria. There she was born on May 21st, 1909, as the third of six children to the merchant Adolf Hummel and his wife Viktoria.

From an early age, the artistic talent of little Berta became apparent, and she was lovingly supported by her parents. She not only learned piano and violin like her siblings, she was also instructed in drawing, because Berta reached for every piece of paper with unbridled zeal,



to paint small pictures. Even the chalk board in her Massing elementary school served as a background for quickly drawn chalk portraits of her classmates, when they demanded: "Hummel Bertl, draw me"! The mother, Viktoria Hummel, writes about her third daughter: "She was a lovely, fair-haired, beautiful child, extremely lively. She loved to paint. A few beautiful flowers, a nice child's face, a beautiful evening atmosphere, an autumn forest, all these could bring her to a rapture, and she would stand for long moments, looking and looking."

"So happy to be here"

The passion for drawing will accompany her throughout her life. After changing to a higher girls' school, the "Marienhöhe Institute" in Sinnbach am Inn, Berta Hummel is allowed to develop her talent. Her works stand out with their artistic quality. And so, only for this talented student, the art room is unlocked so she can work in quiet.

Her path seems to be predetermined: at the age of 18, she enrolls at the then School of Applied Arts in Munich, which later became the Academy of Applied Arts. She ends her education there as the best in her class. Despite offers from her professors to work as an assistant with them, during her studies she has already been attracted by the idea of combining art and religion in her work. In April 1931 she entered the Siessen convent in Württemberg and declared: "I am so happy to be here." On August 30, 1934, she took her religious vows as Sister Maria Innocentia.

Her duties included teaching drawing at a convent-run school. The young woman loved children just as much as she did drawing. The zealous among her students are rewarded with small pictures: drawings of lovable carefree children, which reflect the joy of happy childhood days. Soon, parents ask for portraits of their offspring and the fame of Maria Innocentia Hummel as a very talented artist grows.

In 1934, the Upper Franconian porcelain manufacturer Goebel became aware of her drawings of children. When the first Hummel figures were introduced in 1935, a decades-long international success story began. Sister Maria Innocentia, however, can only enjoy it for a short period of time. After a serious illness she died on November 6, 1946, at the age of only 37 years in the Convent of Siessen.

ummels everywhere, the first ones on the small table near the door and then: figurines where ever you look. Lined up close together on the windowsills, side by side in corner and wall display cases, level upon level, on the tables, in niches, even on the bench next to the tiled stove. I began my visit with Irmtraud Löffler less than two minutes ago and I am already overwhelmed.

The collector is quite different: "Of course I know which figurine was my very first." My hostess gives me a surprised look, obviously I have just asked a particularly stupid question. She walks past me, opens one of the numerous display cases made of wood and fishes out a little girl with waving hair, red dress and red shoes. The wicker basket on the right arm is missing its handle (photo), "a small accident while cleaning," as it turns out. "Everything started with 'Little Shopper'," says Irmtraud Löffler, "a birthday gift in 1990." Since then, the little girl with her large, pretty eyes

and a red bow in her hair has gotten some companionship. One could even say a lot of companionship. Around 850 different Hummel figures

now make up the collection of this Bavarian fan, who prefers not to see her real name in print, including treasures such as "Picture Perfect" or a special edition "Book Worm", which finds its place of honor on the living room table as one of only 111 produced figurines. In the kitchen dinette, on the other hand, stands "Full Speed Ahead" from a cooperation between Hummel and the toy train manufacturer Märklin, for Hummel professionals easily recognizable by the little golden steam engine. In the regular

version the locomotive is painted black. You don't have to be an expert to recognize how much work – and passion – the 72-year-old puts into

the presentation of her figurines. The windowsill in the dining room is laid out with layers of cotton batting to form a magnificent winter landscape, where children play in the snow and angels trumpet from the steeple of the church. And there is also the figure that Irmtraud Löffler has grown particularly fond of: Gerhard Skrobek's "Ride Into Christmas," sculpted in 1991. "When I saw the

boy on the sled for the first time in

the shop," recalls the collector, "I was overwhelmed." She succumbed to the temptation, as so often over the last nearly three decades, and bought the

figure. When it comes to the topic of Hummel, the Bavarian collector freely admits that it is generally difficult for her to resist. And once a figurine has come into her possession, she never wants to part with it. Just like the "Merry Wanderer", almost a dozen of which can be admired at the Löffler's. At one time in the past, three

of them stood in a 33-centimeter masterpiece size on the tiled-stove bench in the living room, gazing up into the sky. "I gave one away," she says, and

»I know that sometimes I exaggerate.« you can tell: Letting it go was not easy for her. The elaborate care of her collection is another story. Every six weeks, Irmtraud Löffler picks up each

of her 850 figures, carefully cleans them and then puts them back in their place. "I know that sometimes I exaggerate," she admits, "but that's just part of collecting for me." I want to know if it's ever been too much for her and she has thought at some point of stopping. Another stupid question – I can see it in her expression. "Never, not a single day in 27 years." And "Little Shopper," of course, will be repaired.

Time to enjoy the outdoors with my dog and casual, happy times with family and friends. Being able to find enjoyment in the simple things in life.





Strength means Health

Mr. Giessing, you say strength training is very important. Should we all become bodybuilders now?

That is actually not necessary, but: Everyone benefits from sensible strength training, at any age. The effort does not have to be immense, two short units a week suffice.

Is strength training the new endurance sport?

Both are equally important, as science knows today. Both have very positive effects on health. But those who cannot do endurance sports anymore can still do a lot of good for their health when they go for a walk. 10,000 steps a day are ideal. In addition to that some muscle training – and you're doing everything right.

Why is strength training so important?

From the age of 30, we lose one to three percent of muscle mass every year. Older persons often have only half of their original muscular mass. This is a problem. On the one hand, as one gets older one gets weaker and frailer. On the other hand, this favors various illnesses, for example, diabetes. The muscles are the largest sugar storehouse in the body. They burn the most carbohydrates. The more muscle mass you have, the lower the risk of developing type II diabetes.

What are the additional positive effects of strength training?

Strength training has a blood pressure regulating effect. In people

with low blood pressure it goes up a bit, in people with high blood pressure it goes down. That's because new blood vessels form as a result of training the muscles. You can compare that to a highway that only has entrance ramps. At some point, everything jams up. The new blood vessels are the exit ramps that relieve the burden overall. Also, strength training reduces the risk of osteoporosis enormously. When you train your muscles, you strengthen your bone structure at the same time. This is an important topic for women, as they are about twice as likely to have osteoporotic fractures as men.

Do I have to go to the gym for strength training?

For some people, such as blood pressure patients, training under supervision may be recommended. Many other people can, however, easily do a few exercises at home. You do not need any special equipment for that. A pull-up bar, which can be hung on the door frame, is readily available at low cost.

Which exercises are important?

Someone who has not done anything for a long time should first rev up his trunk muscles. For this, for example, support exercises are very good. Just lean on your elbows, make yourself long and tighten your muscles. After a few weeks you can start with the classics: squats, push-ups, on the knees first if needed, pull-ups, which can

also be done on a stable table. Together with the support exercises that is enough for a balanced workout. After 15 minutes you are usually finished. In total, everyone should be able to find a half hour a week.

You are an advocate of high intensity training. That sounds scary.

But it is not. Training with high intensity does not mean that you lift heavy weights until your eyes drop out of your head. It means doing one set of an exercise and doing as many repetitions as you can. If you make ten pushups, do eleven. If you can do eleven, try number 12 with your last strength. Then the muscle has the stimulus it needs.

Women are often especially afraid of too much muscle mass.

Very few people have the genetics to become a second Arnold Schwarzenegger. Take a look at how you looked at age 20: You can still train this much muscle mass as you grow older.

Find the Mistakes

Finely chopped seasonal herbs


